I just want to say that this kind of fatalistic attitude is quite foreign to the gospel, and it is a betrayal of the Great Commission!

Certainly, we live in challenging times, but the gospel has not lost its power! God did not give up on the world when they crucified his Son! Instead, he entrusted the gospel of salvation – the good news of God's good purposes for the human beings whom he created in his own image – to a small group of ordinary people: It is never too late to declare the truth to an unbelieving world!

fishermen like Peter and John; women like Mary and Martha. And they not only stood firm against the appalling cruelty of Rome, but they conquered the greatest empire the world had yet known.

If ever we cease declaring a gospel of hope for a cruel and debauched world, we have ceased to preach the gospel of Jesus. But ever since God first revealed his word to Abraham, there has been a cost involved in holding firm to the faith. As the list in Hebrews 11 shows, men and women of faith overcame all the obstacles an unbelieving world could throw at them – and that kind of faith is still available to us today.

It is never too late to declare the truth to an unbelieving world! Jeremiah was still calling for repentance in Jerusalem when the Babylonian army was outside the walls laying siege to the city – because he knew that if there were repentance among the people, even at that late hour, God could intervene and work a miracle of salvation. That is the kind of faith that we need today, one ready to proclaim repentance and salvation to our world. Haggai 2:6-7 says, "This is what the Lord Almighty says: 'In a little while I will once more shake the heavens and the earth, the sea and the dry land. I will shake all nations, and what is desired by all nations will come, and I will fill this house with glory'."

It is more than forty years ago since I began hearing God's promise to shake all nations, and the prophecies of Haggai 2 and Hebrews 12 came alive for me as a promise that I would see in my lifetime. Forty years ago, in our Ministry team, we were told that the shaking would reach such an intensity that people would start crying out, "O God, what has gone wrong?" At that point there would be a new openness to truth. The scales would begin falling away from blind eyes and the opportunity would be there for believers to declare the word of the Lord; and as a result, many would be saved.

I do not believe we have yet reached that point. The shaking of the nations is likely to get much more intense and believers need to hold fast to their faith.

I believe the day will come when God will empower the faithful remnant to reap a harvest among those who are open to the truth before the second coming of Jesus. We all need to be watching and praying – looking for the signs when the fields will be ripe for harvest.

he prologue of John's Gospel says, "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us" (John 1:14). This is a statement of incredible significance which summarises the message of the whole Gospel of John. It states very simply the central mystery of the coming of Jesus, which the Apostle unfolds: the light of the world, come to dwell among humanity, where men prefer darkness to light.

The Greek word that John uses 'dwelling' is ἐσκήνωσεν for ('eskanosen'). It is no coincidence that the consonants of the Greek word έσκήνωσεν give us the Hebrew word 'Shekinah', which denotes the glory of the presence of the Lord. The Tabernacle, or 'tent of meeting', was the place where God dwelt with his people and his glory was to be seen among them throughout the years when the children of Israel were wandering in the wilderness. It was the Shekinah that went ahead of them, preparing the way and offering protection and direction as well as provision.

έσκήνωσεν comes from the word σκηνη which means a tent or tabernacle. Hence, the phrase "made his dwelling among us" literally means he "pitched his tent among us" or "tabernacled among us"; as God had dwelt among his people in the Tabernacle of the Lord when the people of Israel lived in tents. This adds strength and relevance to the belief that Jesus was actually born at the time of the Feast of Tabernacles.

The Prophet Zechariah foresaw the coming of Messiah. He said "Shout and be glad, O daughter of Zion. For I am coming, and I will live among you,' declares the Lord" (Zech 2:10). It is probably these words that John had in mind when he made

his declaration. Zechariah went on to make another statement that came true in the early days of the Church, which Peter acknowledged. Zechariah prophesied, "Many nations will be joined with the Lord in that day and will become my people" (Zech 2:11). Peter saw this fulfilled when Jew and Gentile from different nations came together as believers in Jesus: "Once you were not a



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FURTHER SIGNS OF THE IMMINENT RETURN OF OUR LORD AND SAVIOUR

The peace deal signed in September by Israel, the United Arab Emirates and Bahrain is truly historic, and wonderfully welcome. There are of course pragmatic reasons for this new deal, such as the growing threat to Sunni-led Muslim countries by Iran and its proxies.

It demonstrates realism among Arab leaders who basically want to live in harmony with their neighbours – particularly one who is a major player in the high-tech, military, agricultural and other realms – though fully aware that the Palestinian narrative is something of a sacrifice in the process.

This kind of peace was prophesied by Isaiah (19:23-25) who wrote of a time when the nations to the north and south of Israel would join the Jews in forming a highway of reconciliation, though at a deeper level than mere political manoeuvring.

This has already been increasingly experienced in recent years as Arabs and Jews have seen barriers between them broken down when their hearts open up to Jesus, the Jewish Messiah. This is also a fulfilment of Paul's message to the Ephesians (2:14).

Political peace, meanwhile, may well be only temporary, as belligerent insults and threats from Iran and elsewhere suggest. In Lebanon, Iran's terroristproxy Hezbollah is widely held responsible for the huge explosion in Beirut.

Besides, the darkening clouds have extended beyond Iran to Turkey, rapidly morphing from a secular Muslim state to a strident religious one, with President Erdogan threatening to reclaim Jerusalem's Temple Mount for a revived Ottoman Empire. An unpredictable Russia is also rearing its ugly head as we teeter on the brink of another Cold War.

These point to further signs of the soon return of Christ. Among these is the connection of the new peace deal to the Gog and Magog war of Ezekiel 38, where 'Sheba and Dedan' (the Arabian Peninsula region) appear to be on Israel's side in the end-time invasion that comes from the north (Russia), and involving Iran, Turkey and other nations.

The Bible clearly indicates that the land of Israel will be a source of great controversy in the last days (Zechariah 12-14), leading to a conflict involving all nations. All of this points to the ultimate solution of the Middle East question, and indeed of the world itself – the promised return to Jerusalem, in power and great glory, of our Lord Jesus Christ, whose perfect peace will extend from there to all the earth.

Jesus told us his coming would be visible to all the world (Matt 24:27), and when the signs of its imminence proliferate, we are to lift up our heads, because it means our redemption is drawing near (Luke 21:28).

living in Western societies have been under the illusion that we were in control.

The government, with the backing of most of the population, has been seeking to 'control the virus'. Yet what has happened? The more that lockdowns and restrictions have served to limit the spread of the virus, the more control is lost over other areas of life, with massive increases in mental health problems, domestic violence, isolation and poverty across the world.

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virus have come from a laudable motive - to protect the vulnerable. But in their panic, governments have only deprived other vulnerable people of their livelihoods, of support, of a future. In the end, we have to recognise that we can't control everything.

The Bible warns us of relving too much on our own plans. James warns those who boast of their plans, "Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow ... Instead, vou ought to say, 'If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that."" (Jas 4:13-15)

Ultimately, God is the only one in control. We can plan, and we can make wise decisions, but it is up to God to determine whether these plans can be accomplished.

Will we recognise that this world is a fallen and precarious place, one where we need to trust in God, to use our faith? To steal someone else's saying, it is a faith that is spelt R-I-S-K. A faith where there are no guarantees, except the one that says that God will be always with us, to the end of the age. That he will help us endure. That we will be resurrected for eternal life - a life where there will be no more tears and sickness.

It's a question of where we put our trust and our faith, relinquishing the idea that we can control our own lives. We need to metaphorically hand over the steering wheel of our lives to God, who loves and cares for us. We need to be ready to hear His voice, "This is the way; walk in it." (Isa 30:21) We don't know the future, but we know the God who does.

A Fistful of Shells: West Africa from the Rise of the Slave Trade to the Age of Revolution

This is the best book by far that I have read on the history of West-Central Africa. My knowledge about the 'Medieval' West African empires and states, early diplomatic relations, the dynamics of trade, co-operation with the slave traders and why Islam expanded has increased exponentially as a result of reading this volume.

Part one focuses on Causes: Economic Divergence in West and West-Central Africa, with the second part studying Consequences: Politics, Belief and Revolutions from Below. This is indeed a scholarly piece of work.

As the author writes, "Where older (African) history is taught in the west, it is almost always related to slavery, repeating the old trope of primitivism and oppression. Yet African history is much more complex than this allows, and the root cause of many of the problems of the present lie precisely in this more distant past".

Published in hardback last year and now available in paperback, A Fistful of Shells has been highly acclaimed by many. If you haven't yet, I urge you to read it. It is a stunning piece of work.

2084: Artificial Intelligence and the Future of Humanity



How will technology and Artificial Intelligence change our world? What impact will technological enhancement and bioengineering have on humanity? And what implications do these advances have for our worldview and our understanding of God? Alluding to the dystopian futurist book 1984 by George Orwell, these questions, and more, are tackled expertly by an author who is no stranger to writing on the big questions of science.


Lennox considers both the transhumanist project, with its quest to upgrade humans and solve 'the problem of death', and the issues raised by giving machines 'minds'. He also looks at the 'big brother' aspect of harvesting 'big data'. The author's examples from China, which is already using AI to achieve social control, are particularly chilling. He addresses all these in light of biblical considerations, also asking the inevitable and challenging question: How far will God permit humans to go before intervening?

2084 is an excellent study, which both informs and challenges us to think further about a topic that is already one of the key interfaces between science and Christianity, and which will become increasingly prominent long before we reach 2084.
