I quite literally walked out of the aeroplane, made the necessary phone calls to deal with the CAA and the insurers, and then sat down for a sandwich and a cup of tea!

As I reflected, I was taken by the fact that I remained completely calm throughout.

And that, I believe, is a picture for what God wants for his people in the emergencies and challenges that lie ahead.

It is my contention that, in time, as people move into a period of greater austerity and greater difficulty, and as many people hit the point of despair, it's absolutely vital for us as believers to be prepared for it, and not be fazed by it. We need to be that voice of calm, of confidence, of assurance in our communities when

oday we are witnessing the shaking of the nations to an unprecedented degree. The days of upheaval of which we have been warning for many years in this ministry are now upon us.

The death of our beloved Queen has shaken the whole nation. She was one of the building blocks of stability that kept the nation steady in times of turmoil. She had unshakeable faith in God that kept her steady in times of turmoil such as the death of Princess Diana. She learned a great deal from her father King George VI and his faith in God. I was a child in London all through the bombing and I remember the King and Queen Elizabeth (our Queen's parents) visiting bomb sites and talking with people in the midst of personal tragedies, sharing their faith and encouraging everyone to stand firm. This is where our Queen learned her biblical values of service, faithfulness, integrity, and steadfastness that she followed all the days of her life, working right up to the day before she died. She firmly believed in prayer because she had seen prayer answered in response to her father's faith.

I still vividly remember the day of prayer called by the King in May 1940. It was a desperate situation - with the British army stranded



on the Continent as the Nazi tanks advanced on them. On 27th May 1940, the German High Command announced: "The British army is encircled, and our troops are proceeding to its annihilation".

King George VI had called the whole nation to a Day of Prayer on Sunday 26th May, and huge numbers flocked to the churches. Then three things happened that all appeared to be miraculous:

A spirit of confusion clouded the German High Command, Irrationally, Hitler ordered his generals to halt the advance towards the West coast of France.

A storm of extraordinary fury grounded the German Luftwaffe from 28th May for several days, allowing the British forces to make their way to Dunkirk.

A great calm followed, which

settled over the English Channel, with low cloud cover allowing an armada of little boats to ferry the waiting soldiers from the beaches out to the Royal Navy warships and return to Dover. 335,000 men were

evacuated from Dunkirk - ten times what was expected.

This amazing feat was due to prayer, and the response of ordinary citizens risking their lives on behalf of others in their small boats. It is also a parable of great significance for us today. It shows the amazing things that can happen when small numbers are motivated to do great things

Despite the institutional churches being at their weakest for centuries at a time of great threat to the whole of humanity, God is doing something remarkable. He is mobilising the small groups of praying Christians in the same way as he energised the small ecclesia in New Testament times – when he enabled them to stand firm in days of persecution, and, by the power of the Holy Spirit, to witness to their neighbours and to carry the gospel of salvation to the ends of the Roman Empire.

This is his intention today in these days of shaking, and he is reminding his people of the power that is available to each and every believer. In days of crisis there are three 'Ifs' in the promises of God. They are:

IF - you will seek me with all your heart, I will be found by you, declares the Lord. (Jer 29:13-14)

**IF** – at any time I announce that a nation or kingdom is to be uprooted, torn down and destroyed, and if that nation I warned repents of its evil, then I will relent and not inflict on it the disaster I had planned. (Jer 18:7-8)

**IF** – my people who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn away from their wicked ways. then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and I WILL HEAL THEIR LAND. (2 Chron 7:14)

# IT'S NOT IT, IT'S HIM

I was reading, recently, one of a whole host of beautiful testimonies that formed part of the famed Hebrides revival of 1949-52. The story relates to a schoolgirl in her mid-teens by the name of Fay Macleod.

Months before the revival commenced, both Fay and a close friend began coming under spiritual conviction. Fay became increasingly aware that she was a sinner, and far away from God. She and her friend would ponder aloud what it was that Christians had that they didn't. They couldn't

work it out, but they longed to have it.

Then revival broke out, and news spread that Fay's friend, Chirsty Ann, had been converted at one of the meetings. Fay was thunderstruck on being told, not having a clue what had actually happened to her. "I went to see her; and took one look at her. Her face was transformed – there's no other word for it – she was simply glowing. I said, 'Chirsty Ann – you've got it!"".

Her friend replied, "Oh, Fay, we've been so blind. It's not an 'it' at all, it's a him! I've found him - the Lord Jesus!" Fay threw her arms around her friend, and wept profusely on her shoulders. She accompanied Chirsty Ann to the meeting the following night, and she too found her Saviour, her life being absolutely transformed.

It was the simplicity yet profundity of the story that impacted me. The two schoolgirls had been searching for months for the one thing that could bring them peace and inner satisfaction – only to find that this one thing was a person – Jesus Christ.

Christian life is in essence simple. Yet that doesn't mean it's easy. Most of us know from experience it's not, and Christ teaches us the same, telling his disciples: "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Matt 16:24). And while of course it's true that what we believe is important (1 Tim 6:3; 2 John 1:9), we can get so completely absorbed determining what theological points we absolutely must and must not imbibe – and arguing with others about these – that it becomes easy to overlook what the Christian faith is really all about: relationship bought through Christ's sacrifice on the cross.

How important it is for each of us to come back to our first love (Rev 2:4). That place of intimacy with God. Such closeness of relationship can only come from quality time spent alone in his presence. From asking him to reignite within us a burning passion for Christ.

If we regard time spent alone with God as tedious and unproductive then we have a problem. Surely the thought of just being in his presence is one we would find exciting - seeking to connect with his heartbeat; gleaning truths from the reading of his word; listening to his sweet voice; distilling what he, by his Spirit, might be saying to us, personally, guiding us in the decisions we have to make. Surely that thought should woo us into spending more time alone in fellowship with him.

Our Christian walk is nothing if it's not, at its core, relational. Relational with God himself, and relational with fellow believers. In the difficult days that lie ahead for the Church and for the world, the strength of our relationship with God will ultimately determine both how we withstand the challenges that confront us, and how effective is our practical witness to those around us who are in need.


## OUTSIDE IN' - SEEKING TO SERVE 'OUT OF CHURCH' BELIEVERS

# **TO JUDGE OR NOT TO JUDGE**

We live in a non-judgemental society where any type of behaviour can be defended as personal choice and any criticism is denounced as hurtful. When Christians point out the harm of an aspect of behaviour, particularly of sexual morality, we are often met with the response, 'You shouldn't judge.' or 'It isn't very Christian to go around judging people,' or even 'It's not very loving to criticise.'

Everyone seems to know at least one Bible verse: Matthew 7:1 – "*Do not judge, or you too will be judged.*" This is often played as a trump card to silence any Christian who attempts to say that something is wrong or immoral. After all, isn't this an instruction from our Lord himself?



Whenever someone makes an objection to any aspect of biblical teaching, we can be sure that there is an error in reasoning somewhere; the 'don't judge' argument is a prime example of illogicality. To even tell someone they shouldn't judge is to judge that they are judging, which is considered judgmental, which requires making a judgment about all the judging that is going on!

Saying 'Don't judge' is plain irresponsible and doesn't work in the real world. It would be beyond illogical, and sometimes unsafe, to not judge. Every single day we make judgements of many kinds, some simple, others important. When going to the supermarket we have to choose between 27 different types of bread (I counted); we review them and judge which suits our needs at that time. Occasionally we have to make more important judgements, such as whether an unsolicited message is genuine or fraudulent.

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'Don't judge' is unbiblical. Context is king: Matthew 7:1 only works as a conversation stopper if we delete the next six verses of Scripture. It is clear that, instead of totally forbidding us to judge, Jesus is instructing us on how to make a righteous judgement. He tells us that when we make a judgement on any behaviour, we should first think about our own behaviour and avoid being hypocritical, "First take the plank out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eve." And, if we are to help someone take the speck out of their eve - and our judgements should always be in the context of helping – we must first of all judge that the speck is actually there.

Looking elsewhere in the Bible, we see the importance of making right judgments. Jesus requires us to recognise wolves in sheep's clothing – or false prophets – by their fruit (Matt 7:15-16), which requires us to judge whether or not these teachers are speaking truth. In John 7:24, Jesus instructs us to *"Stop judging by mere appearances and make a righteous judgment."* The apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 5:12f requires us to judge other believers. Telling someone they shouldn't judge is not biblical. In truth, Scripture actually commands us to judge, but to make righteous judgements, humbly, and without hypocrisy.

Making judgements on the behaviour of others, if done properly and gently, can be the loving thing to do. Refusing to judge can do harm to someone who is doing wrong or in a wrong relationship, whilst making a judgement on another's behaviour can be the loving, Christian, thing to do. For those of us who are parents, we make judgements on the behaviour of our children. If we are loving parents, we will correct them if needed. Why? Not because we have a judgemental attitude and want to crush them, but because we care for them and wish the best for their lives. If we simply ignore the 'speck' in their eye and choose not to judge, we could be shaping the rest of their lives in a harmful way.

Judging with right judgment is not only logical and biblical, but it's also the most loving thing you can do.

#### The Transforming Presence: Releasing God's Ability Within You

#### Tom McCann

Maurice Wylie Media, 2021, 164 pages

This is a remarkable work, opening up a connectedness to Christ that most Christians might not believe possible.

The son of missionary parents who lived entirely by faith, which made a deep impression on him, McCann shares his story of seeking – and finding – a deeper 'union with Christ'.

Tom shares several carefully chosen testimonies of seeing God meet his needs in remarkable ways, but it is the teaching that hits home most powerfully.

Recognising that our whole lives are spiritual, and there is no spiritual/secular divide, McCann emphasises that we need to surrender our whole lives to Christ, with the death of self being paramount – not just symbolic but worked out in experience.

The focus then becomes "the presence of the indwelling Christ, who now assumes governance and control within" (p.84). This is achieved through "union with Christ". While, of course, we remain fully human, Christ and the believer are now "one spirit" (1 Cor 6:17). This union is "the summit of God's loving plan of redemption".

This is a delightful study, written with a spirit of humility, easy to read, and packed to the brim with relevant Scripture quotations. A terrific read – I can hardly recommend it enough.

#### The Book That Made Your World, How the Bible created the soul of Western Civilization

#### Vishal Mangalwadi


Thomas Nelson, 2012, 466pp

This book was an eye-opener for me. Some of the impact of the Christian foundation of Western society is plain to see. But in this book, Indian author, Vishal Mangalwadi, makes plain the huge extent of the impact of the Bible on the world, covering a vast sweep of history, and looking at concepts as far ranging as liberty, languages, wealth, medicine and universities.

The chapter on technology is particularly illuminating, as the author examines how the cultivation of the mind and the respect for human dignity instilled by the Bible, even throughout the 'Dark Ages', advanced Western civilisation. He compares the West with India, analysing the difference the work of missionaries made to his homeland. Sadly, but unsurprisingly, he feels compelled to warn of the dangers that the West faces in rejecting biblical standards.

The book is well researched – a labour of love. But inevitably, with the huge scope covered in this study, there are a few small errors. And occasionally, the jump between ideas is too rapid. These faults, however, don't remotely take away from the value of this book, which is truly enlightening and extremely helpful in understanding the vast impact of Christianity on our world.
